




Teen Daily Devotions for Advent

"Advent is a special time of waiting for the joy of Christmas, when we celebrate the birth of Jesus. To get ready, we'll explore the special names for Jesus you might know from the Christmas hymn, 'O Come, O Come Emmanuel'.

For the next 24 days, we'll look at these names. For each day, you will find a reading, a reflection, and a question to chat to God about to get our hearts and minds ready to welcome Jesus."

From **The Additional Needs Alliance**, <u>Sensory stories</u> are short stories broken up into seven to ten parts designed to engage the senses.



These stories have proven to be especially effective with children with additional needs, but we think that all children will be able to enjoy them too.

This collection of six sensory stories for Christmas share the accounts of Zechariah and Elizabeth, Angel Gabriel's Visit to Mary, The Birth of Jesus, The Shepherd's Visit, The Wise Men's Visit and Simeon in the Temple.

To accompany the Story Scripts, you will find Storyteller Notes and a list of recommended sensory resources. There is also a set of Widgit Symbols to accompany the Sensory Stories for Christmas.

Thirtyone:eight

More than Words is a safeguarding resource that equips young people to speak out and take action for themselves and others.

Through six interactive sessions, it explores a theology of care footed in six parables of Jesus and the life he calls us to.

The Feast and Youthscape have partnered to create a practical solution – a card game resource that equips youth leaders to facilitate healthy dialogue on difficult topics.

The game works through role-play and reflection, helping young people understand what healthy dialogue looks like and practice it in a safe space.

Perfect for: Youth groups, schools, churches, community organisations.





We know that it can be challenging for young people exploring their Christian faith to develop a practice of stillness and silence. Life is often filled with activities and distractions that lure them away from taking time to listen to what God might have to say to them.

Be Still is designed to give young people the tools to build silence into their daily routine and to help them create space in their day to hear from God.

The resource guides them through a three-stage process:

- 1. What's on your mind? A chance for young people to write down all their worries and distractions.
- 2. What might God be saying to you? A space to hear from God and to draw or write thoughts and images that come to mind.
- 3. What are you going to take away from this time of stillness? A moment to collect all that God has been saying into one statement that they can reflect on for the rest of the day.

At each stage, the sand timer is turned to allow the time needed to reflect on each of the questions, using the note pad to record their thoughts.

The 'quiet revival', however, has brought about an extraordinary reversal of this position. Members of Gen Z are now searching spiritually in unprecedented numbers and seeking an active faith in which they can play their part in changing the world.
