Thank you

Quinquennial Inspections

Thank you to all of those who have submitted their latest Quinquennial Inspection lately. It is a legal requirement to have them carried out and they help you identify repair needs, both large and small. They also help this team and national bodies understand the state of our church buildings. If you are not sure when your last inspection was carried out, get in touch with the team, who will be happy to guide you.

First Minor Repair and Improvement Grants Agreed! What could you apply for?

Six churches have been offered a grant following an application to the Minor Repair and Improvement Grant fund. These grants will help with a variety of works, from roof and stonework, to drainage improvement and even mending a weathervane.



Belchford, St Peter and St Paul will be able to carry out roof work that was identified in the Quinquennial Inspection. This will enable the roof to remain wind and water tight, helping keep the rest of the building dry.

Croft, All Saints will have strengthening work carried out as the structural issues are monitored. This work will allow time to fully investigate what has happened and to plan for future intervention.



Great Carlton, St John the Baptist will have work to the roof, which will also allow the rainwater goods to be cleared whilst the scaffolding is in place.



Great Coates, St Nicolas will have a series of minor works to the roof and stonework, including some repointing of washed out joints. This will help keep the building in good order.



Halton Holegate, St Andrew will have the underground drainage improved. This work will help get rainwater away from the building, which is key to maintaining a dry building.

This grant fund is open for applications. Projects cannot be more that £10,000 total and the amount of grant available will depend on the Index of Multiple Deprivation (IMD) Score. There is a simple application form, which needs to be accompanied by quotations for the works, copies of the accounts and photographs of where the works will be carried out. Net Zero Carbon Team

This is the first of hopefully many updates from the Net Zero Carbon Team based here in Lincoln. With George Davies joining the Team in June as the Carbon Enabler, I am pleased to say the Team is now complete as there is an awful lot of work to do.

Our overall objective is to support the Diocese in achieving the Church of England's goal to be Net Zero Carbon by 2030. This is an ambitious, but laudable ambition, an area the Church should be visibly taking a lead, and we think can be achieved by working collaboratively together.

The teams main focus to date has been in supporting the effort in getting the Energy Footprint Tool (EFT) data in. The closing date this year is the 31st of July, which is not a lot of time. There's been a lot of site visits, emailing, calls and support going on to try and get as many returns in as possible. There isn't really that much data required when you get into it. The big message remains that the Team is there to help, and by completing your returns, it enables us to then look at ways of raising the funding required to deliver your own individual journeys to net zero.

Why is this data so important, and what do we do with it? Well, the simple answer is the data forms the primary input into us producing a carbon footprint for the Diocese that can also be broken down to an individual level. We then take that footprint to produce a Net Zero Carbon Action Plan for the Diocese. The Action Plan sets the objectives and targets year by year to 2030 and our Net Zero Carbon achievement. It enables us to produce costings and budgets so that the Diocese can bid for the funds it needs to deliver against the Action Plan. Our next update will go into more detail about this.

Six weeks in, and it's been a busy time, we have met some fantastic people on our travels, and some of the projects we have seen have been truly inspiring. It will be exciting working with these and others yet to be identified as we go forward.

The team is here to help, however trivial the query may be.

Swifts

The <u>Grimsby Area Swift Project (GASP)</u> is run by the RSPB Grimsby Local Group to try and help counteract the 60% decrease in swifts in the last 25 years.

The Deanery Environment Champion for North East Lincolnshire, Stiorra Xander-Crabb has worked with the group and Immingham St Andrew, who are looking to install swift boxes at the church. They are also keen to encourage a young lad, <u>Brody</u>, who is enthusiastic about encouraging local wildlife.



Lichens are lovely - do not cause them harm!

We have heard from other support officers that some genealogists have been seen 'cleaning' gravestones in order to make the lettering clearer. There are various problems with this. One is that the lettering can be harmed by the cleaning. Another is that rare lichens can be destroyed. The British Lichen Society states, "Of the 2000 British species, over a third have been found in churchyards and more than 600 have been found growing on churchyard stone in lowland England. Many are scarce and some seldom, if ever, occur in other habitats."

Our churchyards have unique biodiversity and lichens are a key part of this. Consider having a clear policy to protect lichen and not permit harmful cleaning of gravestones and other structures.

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Recommended Monthly Tasks (From <u>SPAB's Faith in</u> <u>Maintenance calendar</u>)

July

- Look at timber windows, doors, fascias and bargeboards. Check for cracked and rotten wood. Redecoration may be required.
- Clear away any plant growth from around the base of the walls and in particular from the drainage channel.
- Have the lightning conductor system serviced once every five years. If your building has a steeple, consider having it inspected by a steeplejack once every five years.

August

· Take a break!

September

- If your roof space has safe access and is boarded, check whether there is evidence of leaks or damage to the roof covering during heavy rain, especially below gutters.
- Clear away any plant growth from around the base of the walls and in particular from the drainage channel.
- Make sure that water tanks and exposed water and heating pipes are protected from frost. Any leaks should be repaired.
- Make sure that any airbricks or under floor ventilators are free from obstruction and clean if necessary.

July - Working at Height

 Falls from height can result in serious injury. Identify circumstances where tasks or access at height may be required and check the precautions you have taken are adequate.

August - Electrical Wiring

• Electricity has the potential to cause considerable damage to property and serious personal injury. Check your electrical systems have been inspected by a qualified electrician within the last five years and all portable appliances have been tested.

September - Slips and Trips

• Our claims data shows that slips and trips are the most common cause of injury in churches. To reduce the risk, review your precautions to tackle slip and trip hazards both indoors and outside.
