'The many unearthed honorific inscriptions in Philippi demonstrate that, after the city of Rome itself, this colony was perhaps the most status-conscious place in the empire.' D.Hamm *Philippians* 2013 Roman colony superseding **Greek city** Wealth from gold mining, farming, location on major road 15,000 people in Paul's day Roman elite 3% Roman farmers 20% Service groups (shopkeepers etc.) 37%, 1/3rd Roman, 2/3rd Greek

The poor 20% Slaves 20%

Philippian Church:

Christians from Roman elite households 4% Christians from colonist farmers 15% Christians from service groups 52% Christian poor 25% Slaves in all of these household categories Over ¾ of Church from service groups and the poor, 16% slaves






Images of Collaboration

1. The Holy Trinity



2. Jesus and his disciples


- Spending a large amount of time with a small group of people

3. The Body of Christ

- Different functions
- Equal dignity
- Special care for the 'weaker parts'

"I therefore, the prisoner in the Lord, beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all. But each of us was given grace according to the measure of Christ's gift" (Ephesians 4:1-7)



4. The language of Leadership: Co-workers

Συνεργός (*sunergos:* co-worker/fellow labourer)

- 1 Thess 3:2, Rom 16:3, 9,21, 2 Cor 8:23, Phil 4:3, Philemon 1:1 named people (men and women – often married couple partnerships) as co-workers
- 1 Cor 3:9 various missionaries working together
- 2 Cor 1:24 working together with those ministered to
- 'Co-worker' is rare in the later/pseudo Pauline corpus (only Col 4:11), when terms we are more familiar with become more common (Πρεσβύτεροι: presbyters/elders, ἐπίσκοπος: overseer/bishop)
- Other common leadership words in early Pauline corpus: ἀπόστολος (apostle) and Διάκονος (deacon)

Models of Ministry

- Model One the collusion that the clergy (plus certain licensed others) are to provide professional services for people, such as leading worship, visiting, preaching, and so on
- Model Two because the vicar is ill or has too much to do, others by delegation – are sometimes 'allowed to help' him/her in carefully supervised ways
- Model Three all Christians by baptism share Christ's ministry for the world. This is a church of, not just for, people. The priest is actually called to be a minister of unity, allowing for the mutuality of different in relation. The priest 'holds the ring' (presides/oversees) in that (s)he invokes in all ministries that which gives the church its specific missionary character – holiness, catholicity and apostolicity


What does good collaboration look like?

- Communication genuine listening time set aside for deep reflection (not just business) – regular pattern of meetings with whole team and individual members
- Each person should know that their ministry is taken seriously and given space to flourish
- Prayer regular prayer together; for the common work and for each other
- Listening to the Holy Spirit

The oversight minister's role in supporting the ministry of team members

For ALMs, Readers, deacons and priests in the team, Church-wardens, other lay leaders

- Being attentive to the distinctive calling and vocation of each team member
- Genuinely shared decision making and vision setting
- Encouraging growth, continued learning and development
- Clear expectations: Working agreements, regular reviews, clear communication about meetings etc
- Beware of under-using team members
- Beware of overloading team members


Be Yourself... and Lead Collaboratively
