Dear Colleagues,

One of the joys of my week is a catch up with my 85-year-old mum. The last time I visited, she presented me with a carefully wrapped present. As I opened it, a golden bronze glow emerged, a smooth velvety surface; the one and only ripe fruit from her apricot tree this year. Rather than keep the bounty for herself, she chose to give it away. Gifting from her 'first fruits' rather than from her surplus is her practice with all her garden crops, always choosing to share the generosity of God with others.

Today is the 1st August, the day in the church year called 'Lammas', a day of thanksgiving for the first-fruits of the season's harvest. On this day the people of God in ancient times presented an offering of first-fruits as a sign of their dependence upon God for their daily bread, which we can read all about in Leviticus 23.9-14.

Tomorrow is the 2nd August, Earth Overshoot Day 2023. This is the day when humanity's demand for ecological resources and services exceeds what Earth can regenerate in that year. After this date, everything we consume is unsustainability 'over budget'. The UK's national Earth Overshoot Day happened on 19th May this year; our lifestyles are significantly ecologically 'over budget'. This Season of Creation is an opportunity to explore the injustice of our overconsumption; to understand more about the impact of our lifestyles on those who have the least; to seek repentance and take action to right our wrongs - a lifetime's journey in faith. Inside this 'Season of Creation' bulletin, I hope you will find resources to help you and your church take your next step on this journey to a more equitable world, where the generosity of God's fruits can be experienced all, *where justice and peace can flow.*

Planning for the Season of Creation 2023: 'Let Justice and Peace Flow'...

Season of Creation 2023

This ecumenical Season of Creation that begins with the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation on September 1st and culminates on October 4th, celebrating the feast of St. Francis of Assisi. This year the theme is "**Let justice and peace flow**", guided by the prophet Amos who cries out, "But let justice roll on like a river, righteousness like a never-failing stream!" (5: 24). We are encouraged to take up climate and ecological justice, and to speak out with and for communities most impacted by climate injustice and biodiversity loss.

"A mighty river" is the symbol chosen to go with this theme, representing biodiversity at risk. The urgency grows and we must make visible **peace** with Earth and on Earth, at the same time that justice calls us to **repentance** and a change of **attitude** and **actions**. When we join the river of justice and peace together with others, it creates **hope** instead of despair.

Hazelnut Community Farm 'Growing Course'

A six session course which explores the relationship between creator God, creation itself, and how we live faithfully as people of the land. It is designed for Christian communities to deepen our connection with creation and reimagine ourselves as people of the land in the midst of the climate emergency. Worshipful, prayerful and hands-on.



Preaching for God's World



There are preaching notes for **all five weeks for the Season of Creation** from contributors from around the world including Revd Rachel Mash, Jo Knight, Revd Shaun Cozett, Bob Kikuyu and Revd Fletcher Harper.

This series of five bible studies have been written for the John Ray Initiative in 2023 by Revd. Rich Clarkson, and is based on a popular earlier series of bible studies written by Dena Burne in 2002 (the latter have now been withdrawn). It draws on both theological and scientific insight to help groups and churches think about what a Christian approach to environmental issues might look like. These are an ideal set of group studies for the Season of Creation or for a Lent Course, but could be used at any time.

Children and Youth Resources from Eco Church
















Messy Adventures

FOOTPRINT CALCULATOR

The WWF's Footprint Calculator helps to measure your carbon footprint, and explore what you might to do lower it. It converts all the different greenhouse gases into an equivalent impact from carbon dioxide, the most common human-caused greenhouse gas. Your footprint value is an annual figure in "tonnes of carbon dioxide equivalent – or tCO2e" and you can see how your footprint compares to average UK and global carbon footprints. **take the test**



Reducing Emissions from Churches

Responding to the climate crisis is an essential part of our responsibility to safeguard God's creation and achieve a just world.

This <u>page</u> sets out the milestones that we, as a whole church, are aiming for in our journey to Net Zero Carbon, 2030. These include increasing the number of churches working towards the different Eco Church awards and ensuring as many people as possible fill in the <u>Energy Footprint Tool</u>.

With links to the detailed <u>Routemap</u>, churches can plan how to contribute to the overall aim to reduce the carbon emissions of our buildings and travel to be less than 10 per cent of our baseline levels, with the rest of the carbon offset via verified schemes.

Every action, however small, adds up. By using the resources in this publication and online, you can review, plan and then action how your church community can play their part.

As part of suite of <u>resources</u> aimed at helping churches make the most of their church buildings, this <u>webinar</u> explains the reasons why keeping on top of your church building maintenance can help lower the building carbon footprint. The key is to keep water away from the building. Next time it rains, look to see if the guttering is working or overflowing. Remember that a damp building takes more energy to heat. New lighting was installed into South Kyme church in 2020. Ann Freeston, churchwarden, explained the motivation. 'The new bulbs enable the congregation to see better but are also more environmentally friendly than the previous incandescent bulbs and should last longer, saving further money.

With better lighting the church is also equipped to host additional events in the building. This year the LED bulbs are making a significant difference to our energy bills, and combined with a renewal energy tariff results in Net Zero lighting and heating.'

As reported in The Sun: Pew, what a scorcher!

Heated pew cushions have been installed at St Swithin's Church, Leadenham. They use just £1 of electricity to warm 100 worshippers through an hour-long service. Installed in 2021, churchwarden Henrietta Reeve said 'It's a Godsend. Some of the congregation don't want to stand for hymns!' Each cushion is individually activated by simply sitting on them but can be turned off if occupiers get too warm. When combined with electricity from a renewable source, then this solutions becomes both cost effective and carbon neutral!'

Case Study



Sit&Heat KovoSchmidt



Amcott's lighting and heating chandeliers were an early example of this form of heating which is now seen in a number of churches in the diocese. Installed in 2016, they have enabled the building to be useable throughout the year as the focus of the small community. The chandeliers can be used just for lighting purposes or with the heaters as well and warm the people rather than the building. This means that there is no need to turn the heating on at 4am before a Sunday service! Combined with a renewable electricity tariff this brings a church's carbon footprint right down. St Wulfram's Church is committed to finding ways to becoming Carbon Neutral. Their Creation Care group have been working on a Routemap to how to achieve the 2030 Carbon Neutral target, whilst respecting the parameters of their Grade 1 listed building. This has culminated in a Solar Panel Project. Their average yearly electricity consumption is 34950kWh. This project will see 78 Solar Panels fitted to the central nave roof and the north aisle roof, along with 9 Pylon tech Lithium-Ion Batteries; read more:

10 Top Tips - Church Energy

As part of the Diocesan <u>10 Top Tips</u> series, this one on <u>Church Energy</u> gives you the quick wins to reduce energy consumption, thus reducing emissions and lowering costs.

Now is a good time to consider what you can do differently as you approach the next heating season.

Embodied Carbon Guidance

Embodied carbon is the carbon associated with the material extraction, transport, manufacture and installation of a product. The Church of England has produced <u>guidance</u> so that embodied carbon can be considered in large and small projects. Whilst embodied carbon is not in scope of the Church of England's net zero carbon target until after 2030, churches can take action now, and it is important to consider when carrying out maintenance and renovations to further aid emissions reduction.

Sustainable Church Flowers

As part of your thinking about how to make your day to day operation more sustainable, consider your church flower policy. Floral foam is a single use plastic and harms the environment. The Sustainable Church Flowers movement has lots of advice on how to create wonderful floral displays without the need for floral foam. The Challenge Badge has four sections. Each section has a range of activites and you can pick which ones suit you and your group. At the end of the pack there are Record Sheets for each child to keep track of their completed challenges.

I-Naturalist is a free, citizen science app which helps you to record, identify and keep track of the wonderful range of biodiversity that you and your community can find in your churchyard. A great way to involve people and learn together as individuals or as groups, of any age as you explore through the seasons the variety of nature in your open spaces.

BirdNet

A free citizen science App developed by Cornell Lab of Ornithology which records the sound of birdsong and helps you identify the birds in your churchyard. The data is used for research purposes, to track the changes over time of bird populations.






